Colorectal Cancer Awareness



Colorectal Cancer (cancer that starts in the colon or rectum) is the second leading cause of cancer deaths for adults in New York State; there are approximately 8,800 new cases diagnosed and about 2,900 adult deaths each year. Early detection of colorectal cancer through regular screening is crucial. Everyone should start screening at age 45, and people at increased risk or with symptoms of colorectal cancer should talk to their doctors about getting tested earlier.

Colorectal Cancer Screening Action Team



Over the summer, the Action Team conducted a targeted digital media campaign to increase awareness about screening at age 45 and test options. An email campaign also educated healthcare providers about insurance coverage of follow-up colonoscopy after a positive fecal test. Both the ad and email campaigns had excellent interactions with high numbers of recipients visiting educational websites.

In April 2024, the team hosted a webinar titled, "Nobody Told Me I Needed to be Screened: Elements of Effective Communication from Community and Clinical Perspectives - Increasing Colorectal Cancer Screening", a panel discussion featuring outreach, navigation, healthcare and community advocate perspectives about effective messaging and what works to help support people getting screened for colorectal cancer. 176 attendees viewed the live webinar which included robust discussion and interactive question and answer session.

In 2025 the Action Team is planning to reach younger populations with messaging about the increasing rates of colorectal cancer among young adults, symptom recognition, and the importance of starting regular screening at age 45.

Environmental Carcinogens Action Team

<u>TOP</u>



In March, the Team hosted a Consortium Quarterly Member Meeting focused on increasing awareness of polyfluoroalkyl substances (PFAs) and other environmental carcinogens, while also providing updates on other initiatives.

The Team also:

- Presented to the Community Advisory Board (CAB) at the Herbert Irving Comprehensive Cancer Center and engaged the CAB in a discussion on research methods and findings.
- Presented to the New York Regional Cancer Collaborative Policy Working Group about the health risks of PFAs and routes of exposure.
- Presented a briefing to members of the New York State legislature on associations between environmental factors and cancer in New York State, including detailed information on cancer risk and mortality trends, PFAS, and endocrine-disrupting chemicals.

For 2025 the Team will host an update of their 2023 *Cancer and Environment* continuing medical education forum, in collaboration with Columbia University and Weill Cornell. This forum will update attendees on the state of environmental carcinogens and the role physicians, nurses, community leaders, and public health practitioners play in engaging in environmental chemicals and cancer risk reduction.

Healthy Eating and Active Living (HEAL) Action Team

In April, the Action Team published a study in the Journal of Community Health describing the influence of COVID-19 and food insecurity among cancer survivors in New York State.

The Team also distributed a guest essay/letter to the editor, *Healthy Meals for All*, in support of Governor Hochul's 2025 New York State Budget proposal of \$180 million to help incentivize eligible schools to participate in the federal Community Eligibility Provision program, which allows all students in participating schools to eat breakfast and lunch free of cost regardless of their families' income. The Healthy School Meals program will serve more than 2.7 million students in New York State.

Human Papillomavirus (HPV) Coalition

<u>TOP</u>



In April, the Coalition held the first New York State HPV Vaccination Summit. The summit included four sessions; *Identifying the Pieces: HPV Prevalence, Burden, and Prevention, Assembling The Pieces to Maximize HPV Vaccination in The Clinical Setting, Fitting Together Community Assets to Reach the Unvaccinated,* and *Understanding the HPV Vaccination Policy Puzzle*, targeting vaccination providers and community organizations. It brought 193 attendees, 30% of whom were vaccinating providers.

Throughout 2024, the Coalition continued to promote the <u>Start at 9</u> campaign across New York State. To date, 59 organizations have endorsed this campaign and communication efforts have reached approximately 100,000.

For 2025, the Coalition will:

- Develop a Peer to Peer (POP) training program that will offer Maintenance of Certification (MOC) Part 4 credits to licensed health care providers.
- > Develop a 'Nine to Thrive' training program for Dentists and Pediatricians.
- Develop a training program for OB/GYNs.
- > Draft a 'College HPV Vaccination Campaign Guide' on how to work with pharmacies and local health departments to vaccinate college students.

Lung Cancer Screening Action Team

TOP



In 2024, the Team published a searchable lung cancer screening locator website that currently includes over 425 screening locations across New York State. The Team also launched an environmental scan survey to identify additional screening sites across the State to better understand the current landscape of lung cancer screening.

In 2025 the Team seeks to incorporate health equity into their initiatives, continue working on legislative steps to expand access to lung cancer screening and follow-up diagnostic testing, and continue to deliver lung cancer screening education to providers and communities.

Skin Cancer Action Team TOP



The Team created a Sun Safety Policy agreement between Sun Protection Outreach Teaching by Students (SPOTS) and the current Cancer Prevention in Action (CPiA) programs that provides sun safety supplies (e.g., sunscreen dispensers, sun safety signage, and shade tents) to students and summer programs (e.g., Boys and Girls Club of Harlem) across New York State.

Dr. Larisa Geskin, Action Team Lead, and Sararose Suhl, Student Lead, both from Columbia University, participated in a social media campaign to increase community education and awareness on sun safety.

The Team also collaborated with the Firefighters Cancer Support Network to organize screening events, reaching hundreds of firefighters to date. Those at high risk for skin cancer are promptly referred to a dermatologist for further assessment.

For 2025, the team plans aims to provide sun safety education via health fairs and firefighter skin protection events, as well as promote school-based sun safety policy.

Survivorship Action Team TOP



In the first half of 2024, the team developed and implemented a <u>6-part ECHO series</u> that covered the main issues faced by cancer survivors, with a focus on those who live in rural parts of the State. An abstract on the ECHO project, titled "Rural Cancer Survivorship: Project ECHO for Primary Care Clinical Teams" was accepted for oral presentation at the Cancer in Primary Care Research International (Ca-PRI) conference in April 2025 at The University of Manchester.

In 2025 the Team is continuing its efforts to educate healthcare practices on ways to improve care of cancer survivors, focusing on educating staff responsible for providing patient navigation for rural cancer survivors.
