

Components of Cancer Survivorship Care

In cancer, survivorship focuses on the **health and well-being** of a person with cancer from the time of diagnosis until the end of life.

This includes the **physical**, **mental**, **emotional**, **social**, **and financial** effects of cancer that begin at diagnosis and continue through treatment and beyond.

The survivorship experience also includes issues related to follow-up care (including regular health and wellness checkups), late effects of treatment, cancer recurrence, second cancers, and quality of life.


Family members, friends, and caregivers are also considered part of the survivorship experience.







Cancer Survivors Community Engagement Forum Focus Group Findings

Transition of care from treatment to survivorship

- Feeling lost; need for advocacy
- Not knowing what comes next

Roles & Responsibilities

• Confusion & anxiety over changes in providers, roles & responsibilities in care

Communication Issues

- Not being "heard"
- Symptoms & concerns not being taken seriously
- Feeling like they have been "dropped off a cliff"
- No communication about what is coming, or what to expect

Financial & Legal Issues

- Falling through the cracks in insurance coverage
- Not sure how to deal with disabilities
- Need help to navigate issues with insurance coverage, post treatment and survivorship care benefits
