



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 A safe space is key to dialogue and trust building. Yet I have been around many people and in many places who/that claimed to be safe yet never felt that way. So what is needed to make a space safe?

Building a safe space

 Creating a safe space involves fostering an environment where individuals feel comfortable to express themselves without fear of judgement or harm (NIH, 2021)

- Build trust
- Show empathy
- Establish clear boundaries
- Create a welcoming environment
- Be inclusive and respectful
- Foster a sense of belonging
- Be mindful of your own actions

<u>ALIGNING WITH PATIENT'S VALUES</u>

"As I listen to you today, it sounds like you are most concerned about....

(your future)

(your cancer returning)

(not being a burden on your family)

(being more comfortable)

Trauma Informed Care

- Safety (physical and emotional)
- Trustworthiness (clarity, consistency, boundaries)
- Support (I will do my best to help you figure this out)
- Collaboration (making decisions with patients = shared power)
- Empowerment (Giving a person choices gives the person control)
- Transparency (sharing all information with the person)

Disparities in rural settings

"Approximately 40% of patients with cancer experience significant emotional and social distress during treatment (Pranjic, Bajraktarevic & Ramic) 2016),(2)

"Rural residents are significantly more likely than non-rural residents to die following traumatic injury." (1)

"Cancer-related PTSD (CR-PTSD) can negatively affect a patient's psychosocial and physical well-being during treatment and into survivorship." (2)

How do you know if a person has experienced trauma?

You don't

Universal precautions:

To avoid spreading germs you wash hands and wear gloves.

 Treating all patients as if they have had a trauma Event in their life to avoid re-traumatization(triggering).
